Pendant votre absence

La période estivale s'est déroulée sur fond de crises politiques. Au mois de juin, le gouvernement fédéral est allé de l'avant avec son projet d'abolir la version longue du recensement, restant sourd aux recommandations formulées par l'ancien statisticien en chef Ivan Fellegi et en se réfugiant derrière des lois en matière de protection des renseignements personnels (qui servent de plus en plus de justificatif ces jours-ci). En dépit de la levée de bouclier que cette décision a provoqué chez de nombreuses associations universitaires dont l'ACG, ainsi que la Banque du Canada, l'Institut C.D. Howe, la Chambre de commerce du Canada, des anciens greffiers du Conseil privé (ce bureau est responsable des opérations de la fonction publique), et le Congrès canadien du travail (bref, des représentants des milieux universitaires et gouvernementaux, du secteur privé et des organisations non gouvernementales), le gouvernement a fait preuve d'intransigeance en gardant le cap sur sa politique désastreuse. Des personnalités puissantes, responsables et éminentes ont fait circuler des pétitions au Canada, mais leurs revendications sont restées lettre morte.

À une toute autre échelle, l'Institut canadien des urbanistes s'est prononcé contre la reconnaissance des programmes de premier cycle en géographie humaine qui signifie que ceux-ci ne répondent plus aux critères d'affiliation et qu'un diplôme en géographie, estime t'on, ne remplit plus les conditions requises pour pouvoir réduire la charge de travaux pratiques en vue de présenter une demande d'agrément au Canada. Une conséquence de cette décision est que les programmes d'études que nous offrons ne correspondent pas aux attentes des étudiants qui s'orientent vers le métier d'urbaniste. L'Institut nous a fait part, suite à une demande d'informations, de son intention de se consacrer au rehaussement du niveau de spécialisation professionnelle au Canada. En fait, il redoute que certains des programmes de géographie offerts présentement cadrent avec les exigences du métier. D'ailleurs, l'ACG entend poursuivre la discussion à ce sujet avec l'Institut. Tous les membres qui se sentent interpellés par cette décision peuvent fournir des conseils au comité exécutif à cet égard.

While You Were Away

It has been a summer of legislative crises. In June the federal government, against the advice of its former chief statistician Ivan Fellegi, and hiding behind privacy laws (which seem to be the excuse for much these days) decided to end the long form census. In spite of a chorus of opposition from a full array of academic associations, including the CAG, the Bank of Canada, the C.D. Howe Institute, the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, former Clerks of the Privy Council (the office that runs the public service) and the Canadian Labour Congress, (in short academic, government, private sector and non-government organizations), the government has persisted in this disastrous policy decision. So far petitions from the most powerful, responsible and educated people in Canada have had little effect. But the pressure is being maintained.

On a smaller scale, the Canadian Institute of Planners has decided to no longer recognize the

CHRONIQUE DU PRÉSIDENT

À une échelle encore plus petite, un nombre de disciplines enseignées dans les différents établissements universitaires du Canada subiraient présentement une attaque frontale, et la nôtre serait particulièrement visée. Le doyen de la Faculté des arts et sciences de l'Université de Toronto a demandé aux géographes physiques de même que les géologues et physiciens de former un nouveau programme d'études en sciences de la Terre. Ils sont plusieurs à l'Université de Toronto à penser que cette décision signifie le démantèlement d'un des fleurons des programmes de géographie au Canada. S'il est vrai que le président de l'Association des géographes américains Kenneth Foote et moi reconnaissons le rôle essentiel de l'innovation, nous avons tous les deux écrit au doyen afin de l'enjoindre à retarder les prises de décisions finales, et à s'assurer que le département soit présent et puisse faire entendre sa voix dans les discussions sur les changements prévus. Je remarque que cette tendance se confirme dans mon propre établissement qui entend priver les départements universitaires déjà existants des ressources et de la capacité de prendre des décisions alors qu'on annonce la création de nouvelles entités interdisciplinaires au budget précaire en s'alignant sur les priorités actuelles établies par le gouvernement en matière de financement. Ces entités poursuivent leur existence longtemps après que le gouvernement adopte de nouvelles priorités et se retrouvent ainsi dans un état de sous financement chronique. Par conséquent, elles privent à leur tour les disciplines universitaires déjà établies des ressources disponibles, en commençant par les départements de géographie.

Les mauvaises nouvelles réunies dans ce bulletin tranchent avec ce qu'on a l'habitude de lire à la rentrée, mais elles correspondent à la réalité qui nous entoure. Plus que jamais, que vous soyez en vacances ou au travail, un devoir de vigilance s'impose. Face à la situation qui prévaut dans le milieu universitaire et dans la société en général, votre Association s'est investie de la mission de protéger la géographie et les géographes, mais il est de la plus haute importance que vous soyez conscients des enjeux et que vous puissiez contribuer à orienter les changements.

PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

undergraduate degree in human geography as an affiliated degree, which means that a geography degree will not be eligible for reducing the applied portion of work for planning accreditation in Canada. This will make our degrees less interesting for students wanting to seek a career in planning. Initial inquiries suggest that the Institute is seeking to increase the professional nature of the profession in Canada and is concerned that not all geography degrees are applicable to its practice. The CAG is taking this matter up with the Institute. Any advice interested and concerned members would like to offer the Executive would be most welcome.

On a yet smaller scale, disciplines seem to be under attack in many universities in Canada, our discipline perhaps more than most. The Dean of Arts and Science at the University of Toronto has decided to invite its physical geographers to join geologists and physicists in forming a new Earth Sciences program. Many at the University of Toronto see this as nothing less than the dismantling of one of Canada's flagship geography programs. While both Kenneth Foote, President of the Association of American Geographers, and I see the importance of innovation, we have both written to the Dean requesting that he not move precipitously or irrevocably and involve the department fully in any discussions leading to change. In general, at my own institution I have noticed a strong propensity to pull resources and decision-making power from established academic departments while simultaneously creating new underfunded interdisciplinary units to respond to short-term governmental funding priorities. These units survive long after the government's funding priorities have shifted and, as they are underfunded, tend to draw resources away from the more established academic disciplines, none more than geography.

This is not one of those good news Newsletters we hope for after our summer break but it reflects the realities we are now facing. It is very important that, vacation or not, we remain vigilant about what is happening in academe and our larger society. Your Association is working to protect geography and geographers but it is vital that you remain aware of what is happening and active in directing change.

Le candidat doit s'être illustré par la mise au point ou l'application de techniques ou d'instruments géographiques utilisés au service du gouvernement ou du monde des affaires, ou avoir plusieurs réalisations en géographie au service du gouvernement ou du monde des affaires à son actif. *

Le prix d'excellence pour l'enseignement en géographie

Pour reconnaître l'importance primordiale de l'excellence des professeurs de géographie, l'ACG décerne ce prix à un membre de l'ACG qui enseigne dans un établissement reconnu, que ce soit une université, un collège, un cégep ou une école secondaire. Le candidat doit être au moins professeur à temps plein ou à temps partiel, chargé d'enseigner un cours d'une année et être le premier responsable de l'organisation et de la présentation de la matière en classe cours. Normalement, le candidat est un professeur qui s'est illustré dans des cours suivis par un effectif restreint ou nombreux, à différents niveaux du curriculum universitaire, depuis plusieurs années dans l'établissement qui propose sa candidature. *

2011 CAG Awards - Call for Nominations

Please take a moment to look over this year's Call for Nominations and consider whose efforts deserve national recognition.

Award For Scholarly Distinction In Geography

The purpose of the award is to recognize a member of the CAG for outstanding scholarly work in geography either in the form of sustained contributions over a number of years or as a single major research contribution. *

Award for Service to the Profession of Geography

This award is intended to recognize a member of the CAG for exceptional professional service over a period of years - for example, in the university training of geographers, in administration or similar activities in the public service, as an officer of a learned society, or in such other ways as have significantly advanced the profession and practice of geography in Canada. *

Award for Geography in the Service of Government or Business

Established in 1997 in recognition of the primary importance of excellence in geography in the service of government or business, the Canadian Association of Geographers (CAG) offers this award to someone who has carried out major work for or in the public or private sector. Normally a nominee would have distinguished himself or herself through the development or application of geographic techniques or tools used in the service of government or business or has a record of achievement for geography in the service of government or business over a long period of time. *

Award For Excellence In Teaching Geography

In recognition of the primary importance of teaching excellence in geographic education, the Canadian Association of Geographers (CAG) offers, since 1997, this award to a member of the CAG who teaches in a recognized university, college, CEGEP or high school. At a minimum, a nominee must be the member of the teaching staff, full or part-time, hired to teach a course in any one year, who has primary responsibility for organizing and presenting course material. Normally, a nominee would be a member of the teaching staff, who has distinguished herself or himself in courses with small and large enrolments, at different levels of instruction, over several years of teaching in the nominating institution. *

Modalités de mise en candidature

Admissibilité

Le candidat ou la candidate doit être un membre en règle de l'ACG, à l'exception du prix de géographie au service du gouvernement ou des affaires. Les candidats qui ont contribué à l'avancement de la géographie canadienne mais qui ne sont pas canadiens peuvent aussi déposer leur dossier de candidature.

Mise en candidature

Une lettre de mise en candidature distincte doit être présentée pour chacun des prix. Chaque mise en candidature doit être accompagnée d'une page couverture inclus ici ou qui peut être téléchargée du site web de l'ACG en format pdf. Cette page doit être signée par trois membres de l'ACG ou, dans le cas du prix d'excellence pour l'enseignement en géographie, par trois étudiants ou collègues de travail. Si cela pose trop de problèmes, les noms des trois personnes proposant la candidature peuvent être ajoutés au formulaire à condition que chacune d'entre elles fait parvenir un courriel au secrétariat de l'ACG confirmant son appui.

La lettre de mise en candidature doit préciser la catégorie du prix, fournir une brève justification de la candidature et être jointe d'une version électronique récente du curriculum vitae. Seulement UNE lettre de mise en candidature sera acceptée. Des pièces justificatives incomplètes et illisibles compromettent les chances du candidat et ne peuvent que nuire à l'étude de son dossier. La lettre, le curriculum vitae ainsi que les documents d'accompagnement d'une longueur maximale de trente-cinq pages au total peuvent être envoyés en pièces attachées par courriel électronique.

Les candidatures refusées à leur première année d'admissibilité seront retenues pour deux années consécutives. Dans ce cas, seule la copie originale de la mise en candidature est requise, mais le candidat est invité à mettre son dossier à jour en faisant parvenir les informations complémentaires avant la date d'échéance de l'année suivante.

La page de couverture devrait être transmise par télécopieur au (514) 398-7437 ou par la poste à l'adresse ci-dessous ou les noms des trois personnes proposant la candidature peuvent être ajoutés au formulaire à condition que chacune d'entre elles faire parvenir un courriel au bureau de l'ACG confirmant son appui.

Nominations procedures of the CAG Awards

Eligibility

The nominee must be a current member of the CAG, EXCEPT in the case of the Award for Geography in the Service of Government or Business. Nominees may include non-Canadians who have made significant contributions to Canadian geography.

Nominations

A separate letter of nomination/support must be submitted for each award. Each nomination must include the nomination cover page which is enclosed in this issue or may be downloaded from the CAG website as a pdf file. The nomination cover page must be signed by three CAG members or, in the case of the Award For Excellence In Teaching Geography, by three students or co-workers. If this is impractical, the names of the three nominators may be printed on the cover page provided that each nominator's support is confirmed by an e-mail sent to the CAG office.

The letter of nomination/support must indicate the category of award, provide a succinct rationale for the nomination, and be accompanied by an electronic version of a current curriculum vitae. Only ONE letter of nomination/support from the chief nominator will be accepted. Failure to provide such supporting evidence in complete and legible form is a disservice to the candidate and prejudices a fair and comprehensive assessment of the nomination. The letter, curriculum vitae and any other supporting materials to a maximum of 35 pages total should be sent as an e-mail attachment.

Unsuccessful nominations will be retained and reconsidered for two additional years. In such cases, a new nomination is not required, however, additional information from the nominator is welcome provided that it is submitted prior to the next year's deadline.

The cover page should be faxed to (514) 398-7437 or mailed to the address below or the names of the three nominators may be printed on the cover page provided that each nominator's support is confirmed by an e-mail sent to the CAG office.

**Le prix Julian M. Szeicz
pour réalisations en début de carrière**

Le prix Julian M. Szeicz rend hommage à la mémoire et aux réalisations du Dr Julian M. Szeicz (1965-1998).

L'Association canadienne des géographes (ACG) décerne ce prix annuellement pour récompenser une contribution à la recherche et l'excellence d'un géographe canadien en début de carrière. Le prix a pour but de favoriser les études en géographie sur le Canada et de reconnaître le travail des nouveaux géographes. Voir www.cag-acg.ca/fr/js_award_recipients.html pour la liste des lauréats.

Critères - Ce prix est destiné à un jeune chercheur qui possède un dossier de réalisations en recherche et qui fait preuve d'excellence en matière de géographie canadienne. Il s'agit entre autres d'un travail de synthèse ou d'une étude régionale, d'une innovation conceptuelle, d'un avancement important en recherche dans un sous-domaine spécialisé de la géographie ou encore de la mise au point d'une technique.

Le lauréat du prix doit être :

- membre de l'Association canadienne des géographes avant la date de la mise en candidature ;
- citoyen canadien ou résident permanent ;
- en voie d'obtention d'un doctorat dans les huit prochaines années mais ayant des résultats remarquables au niveau de la maîtrise ou du baccalauréat, et ce, en date du 31 décembre de l'année de la remise du prix.

Processus de sélection - Le Comité des prix de l'Association canadienne des géographes fait part de ses recommandations au comité exécutif de l'ACG.

Mise en candidature - Une lettre d'appui présentant la personne qui dépose sa candidature est signée par deux membres de l'ACG et acheminée au président du Comité des prix de l'ACG. Elle devrait indiquer la contribution à la recherche du candidat et expliquer pourquoi elle est importante. Le dossier de candidature devra comporter la lettre d'appui, le curriculum vitae du candidat et les documents d'accompagnement d'une longueur maximale de trente pages. Il peut être envoyé en pièces attachées par courrier électronique à l'adresse suivante : valerie.shoffey@cag-acg.ca avant le 31 janvier 2011.

Prix - Une plaque est remise au lauréat du prix Julian M. Szeicz lors du congrès annuel de l'ACG qui prendra en charge tous ses frais de déplacement et de séjour.

**The Julian M. Szeicz Award
for Early Career Achievement**

The Julian M. Szeicz Award honours the memory and achievement of Dr. Julian M. Szeicz (1965-1998).

The award is presented annually by the Canadian Association of Geographers in recognition of research achievement and career potential by a Canadian geographer at an early career stage. The purpose of the award is to foster the development of geographical studies of Canada and to provide recognition of recently established geographical practitioners. See the list of award recipients.

Criteria - The award recognizes research achievement and career potential in Canadian geography. This may take the form of an original synthesis or regional study, a conceptual development, a significant research advance in a subfield of geography, or the development of a technique.

The recipient of the award must be:

- A member of the Canadian Association of Geographers, prior to the time of nomination;
- A Canadian citizen or landed immigrant;
- Within eight years of graduation, normally from a PhD, but in exceptional circumstances from a Master's or Bachelor's programme, on December 31 of the year of the award.

Adjudication - Recommendations for the award are made to the Executive of the Canadian Association of Geographers by the CAG Awards Committee.

Nominations - Nominations are to be made in a letter to the Chair of the CAG Awards Committee, signed by two members of the CAG. The letter of support should identify the nominee's research achievement and explain why it is considered significant. The letter of support, nominee's current curriculum vitae and supporting materials to a maximum of thirty pages should be sent as an e-mail attachment to the CAG office at valerie.shoffey@cag-acg.ca by the 31st of January 2011.

The Award - The Julian M. Szeicz Award is recorded on a plaque and the award winner is invited, expenses paid, to attend the Annual Meeting of the CAG, to receive the award.

**Le prix Starkey-Robinson
de la recherche supérieure sur le Canada**

Le prix Starkey-Robinson reconnaît la valeur de la recherche supérieure de grande qualité qui contribue à l'avancement des connaissances sur la géographie du Canada. Le Comité des prix de l'Association canadienne des géographes (ACG) décerne ce prix. Les conditions d'admissibilité pour recevoir ce prix sont la réalisation d'une thèse ou d'un travail de recherche équivalent de deuxième ou de troisième cycle dans une université canadienne au cours des deux dernières années.

L'ACG accepte UNE SEULE candidature par département de géographie offrant un programme d'études supérieures.

Le directeur du département ou le responsable des études supérieures devrait soumettre les dossiers de candidature au bureau de l'ACG avant le 31 janvier, 2011. Le dossier de candidature devra comprendre un court résumé du sujet de recherche et des principales conclusions (pas plus de deux pages). Il devra également expliquer en quoi ce travail est pertinent pour la recherche en géographie du Canada. On peut joindre au dossier de candidature un résumé d'une page de la thèse et un extrait de la thèse d'une longueur maximale de huit pages. **The Starkey-Robinson Award
for Graduate Research on Canada**

The Starkey-Robinson Award gives recognition to high quality graduate research that furthers understanding of the geography of Canada. The Award is adjudicated annually by the Awards Committee of the CAG. Eligibility for the Award is based on the completion of a thesis or comparable work at the Masters or Doctoral level at a Canadian University within the preceding 2 years.

The CAG will accept ONE nomination for the Award from each Geography department with a graduate program.

Nominations for the Award should be submitted to the CAG Office by Departmental Chairs or Graduate Supervisors by January 31st, 2011. Each nomination should include a brief statement (maximum two pages) outlining the topic and findings of the work and explaining its significance for the geography of Canada. An extract from the thesis (or equivalent) of a maximum of eight pages may be attached to the nomination. Each nomination and accompanying documents must be submitted electronically to valerie.shoffey@cag-acg.ca.

The Award is a cash prize, currently a single award of \$500. The number and value of awards made annually will be determined from time to time by the Executive Committee of the CAG. In any year, the Awards Committee may decline to make an award.

Memorial Prize
for Excellence in Native Studies**

The Armstrong Memorial Prize recognizes and promotes excellence in applied research on Canada's Aboriginal peoples. It was established to commemorate the contribution of Robin P. Armstrong to research on Aboriginal issues within the government of Canada and the CAG. The prize is drawn from a fund established in Robin Armstrong's memory with donations from the Armstrong family, individuals who wished to commemorate Robin in this way, the Department of Indian Affairs, and Statistics Canada.

The Canadian Association of Geographers (CAG), Statistics Canada, and Indian and Northern Affairs Canada award the Robin P. Armstrong Memorial Prize for Excellence in Native Studies to a graduate student in geography or native studies for the best Master's or Ph.D. thesis on an aboriginal topic.

This Award Was Established To:

- recognize and promote excellence in applied research on Canada's aboriginal peoples;
- commemorate the contribution of Robin P. Armstrong in undertaking and promoting excellence in geographical research and quantitative analysis on aboriginal issues within the government of Canada and the CAG, and in helping to found the Indigenous Peoples Working Group (formerly the Native Canadians Specialty Group) of the CAG.

The Prize Includes:

- a cash prize of \$1,000, based on the funds available in the Robin P. Armstrong Memorial Fund;
- an opportunity to present a paper during a special Indigenous Peoples Working Group session at the CAG conference (or one of the regional CAG conferences);
- nation-wide publication of the winner's name on the Statistics Canada and CAG Web sites

An Exciting Year for Students and CAG

There is so much excitement at this time of year as universities and colleges move into the full swing of the academic year and students re-populate campuses and communities that have been eerily quiet over the summer. One of the most great things about this time of year is the energy that students bring to campus and community life by their presence and by their contributions.

Geography students across Canada are generous and innovative about reaching out into the community. Through GIS Day, community projects, service learning and much more, geographers reach beyond campus, making a difference while advancing our discipline. This year, CAG will support the volunteer efforts of geography students at the post-secondary level who are actively engaged in community outreach with a ***Geographical Outreach, Activity, and Learning (GOAL Program)***. The purpose of the program is to promote awareness of geography and CAG, and to promote geographical education at all levels.

The GOAL Program

CAG has set aside \$5,000 to support five or more outreach projects by university or college geography groups, which could be clubs, associations, societies, or a special-purpose project team if this team is recognized by your department. The maximum contribution from CAG will be \$1,000, so more than five awards may be made depending on the demand for funds and the number of applications (some groups may apply for less than \$1,000).

There is a lot of flexibility on what groups can do – outreach activities could include connecting university geography students presenting GIS concepts and software to high school students, a field camp or orienteering day at an outdoor day camp, community conservation or clean up activities, or presenting local research or material from class presentations to community members or other students who could benefit from the information. It depends on your interests and community! GOAL Program funding could help cover the costs of the activity – transportation for participating students, promoting and carrying out projects, printing posters, or catering for an event. The expenses should be reasonable and in line with your institutions' guidelines. This program especially welcomes undergraduate students.

The application is straightforward and includes a summary of the project, the objectives, a budget and your community partner. It will require a signature from your community contact person and

OBITUARY

GILL, Warren, friend, colleague, gentleman and scholar, passed away this Sept.

Warren worked tirelessly during his 33-year tenure to expand the reach and reputation of Simon Fraser University. A Vancouver native with a PhD in urban geography from the University of British Columbia, Dr. Gill joined the University in 1977 and quickly became a champion for the creation of a downtown Vancouver campus. He was intimately involved in all stages of that development, which grew from the original Harbour Centre complex to include the Wosk Centre for Dialogue, the Segal Graduate School of Business, and most recently SFU Woodward's.

Warren treasured his association with the SFU geography department, where he was a popular teacher of urban and transportation geography.

A recipient of the UBC geography alumni's 2000 distinguished geographer award, he was a member of a number of professional organizations including the Canadian Association of Geographers, the Association of American Geographers and the World Congress on Transport Research and the Western Regional Science Association, of which he was proud to be President Elect.

SANDERSON, Marie - Lifelong geographer Marie Sanderson passed away peacefully on July 12, 2010 at the age of 88.

She began her academic life at the University of Toronto where she was one of the first graduates in geography in 1944. She went on to earn her Masters degree in geography from the University of Maryland and later her PhD from the University of Michigan. Marie began her teaching career at the University of Windsor in 1965 and over the course of her 23 years as a professor of geography there, she also taught for short periods at the University of Hawaii, and in the Nunavut region of Arctic Canada where she organized courses on the Arctic environment. Her special interest in the Great Lakes led to the creation of the Great Lakes Institute, of which she was the founding director.

On retirement from the University of Windsor in 1988, Marie formed The Water Network at the University of Waterloo for 10 years, and then returned to Toronto where she remained active in the alumni affairs of the geography department at the University of Toronto. A career as a geographer-climatologist dedicated to teaching and research resulted in many recognitions, including honorary degrees from the universities of Waterloo, Windsor, Lethbridge, Ryerson and Toronto. As a devoted
