Dr. Luginaah elected as Fellow to the Royal Society of Canada

Canadian Health Geographer **Dr. Isaac Luginaah** (Professor, Western University)
has been elected as a new **Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada (RSC)**. Fellows are elected by the RSC in recognition for career achievement is the highest honour an individual can achieve in the arts, sciences, and social sciences.

Dr. Luginaah completed his PhD in medical geography at McMaster University in 2001, with a focus on environmental stressors, risk perception and health. He joined Western as faculty in 2004 and has further developed broad range of research interests and expertise, with authorship on over 350 peer-reviewed journal publications (and counting). His contributions to the sub-discipline is

further evidenced through the two terms as the Canada Research Chair in Health Geography.

Through the Environment, Health and Hazards Lab at Western University, he has supervised 18 PhD students (7 more currently in progress) and 35 Master's (5 more currently in progress) under the topics of environment and health, population health, or other determinants of population health. Many of these students have gone on to their own successful careers in health geography. Dr. Luginaah was the Senior Editor of the journal African Geographical Review and remains very involved in both the African and Health Geography communities in North America.

Considering public toilet access and the geographies gastrointestinal illnesses

At this year's CAGONT annual meeting at Toronto Metropolitan University (October 27-28, 2023) **Stefanie Kiriazis** (Geography MA Candidate, York University) joined the GHHCSG themed sessions organized by Andrea Rishworth, to present findings from her work on the geographies of gastrointestinal illness. While issues of WASH (Water, Sanitation, Hygiene) have rightfully become a central theme for many of our colleagues's research programs, the consideration of public toilet access in this country's largest city brings a new perspective to these issues. We were so intrigued by this presentation, we asked Stephanie to share more about the grounding for this research, how health geography as subdiscipline supports this work, and the value of presenting at academic conferences.

My research aims to centre the lived geographies of youth with gastrointestinal illnesses among the wider discourses of public toilet access, with a case study on the Greater Toronto Area. I was inspired to pursue this research through my own personal experience as a young woman living with Ulcerative Colitis, particularly, the barriers I faced navigating public spaces as a university student with a medical need for toilet access. My research operates under the belief that all individuals have right to the city claims, and that public toilets are critical infrastructure under this right.

GI illnesses are an understudied population, which require their own investigation as a result of their differential needs. For example, youth are often operating under tighter budgets than older adults, and this can become a challenge when coupled with GI toilet needs, as the majority of our 'public' toilets exist within private spaces, often requiring a purchase for use.



Beyond the fact that youth with GI illnesses are an understudied population, public toilet access is a topic that benefits a vast group of demographics, with women, homeless, disabled, gender-diverse and queer populations being just some among those who struggle with our lacking public toilet infrastructure. Everyone needs to use the toilet, and it is inevitable to have this need occur in public at some points throughout our daily journeys. It only makes sense to have one of our most basic human needs supported by our city's built form.





Health Geography informs my research as a discipline through its ability to explain the spatial relationships between health conditions and the built environment. With gastrointestinal illnesses, public toilets become central infrastructures to support daily health needs. Health Geography allows my research to investigate the ways in which a lack of adequate public toilet access impacts the mental and physical health of individuals who rely on them, in addition to the ways in which this barrier extends into individuals social, home, and school/work lives.



I chose to attend this conference to share my research progress and connect with others who have similar interests. I am grateful to have had an opportunity to not only present my research, and hear thoughts and feedback from other attendees, but to see what other research is taking place in geography, especially in health geography. Being in a space such as the CAG[ONT] conference is a reminder of why I want to research in the first place.

The CAG[ONT] conference supported my research and thinking by giving me an opportunity to gain valuable feedback, network, and learn about new ways I can stay connected with researchers who have similar interests, and stay up to date on future opportunities.
