Rodolphe De Koninck

Pour révéler les multiples facettes de la profession de géographe, Rodolphe De Koninck a choisi la veine autobiographique. Ses lecteurs le suivront donc de l'Ouganda aux Cent-Îles du lac Saint-Pierre, de la Malaisie à la Grèce, de l'Indonésie à la Nouvelle-Orléans. Ils découvriront l'importance de la cartographie, ils verront comment la géographie a partie liée avec l'urbanisme et les sciences de l'environnement, ils revivront des crises (le tsunami de 2004, l'ouragan Katrina de 2005). Ils suivront à la trace un pédagogue et un citoyen engagé. Surtout, ils devront constater la place centrale que la géographie occupe dans leur vie.

Rodolphe De Koninck a été professeur au Département de géographie de l'Université Laval (Québec, Canada) de 1970 à 2002. Depuis 2002, il est titulaire de la Chaire de recherche du Canada en études asiatiques de l'Université de Montréal. Il est l'auteur de vingt livres, directeur de publication de quinze autres et de plus de 140 articles scientifiques parus dans 25 revues et journaux, dans douze pays et en cinq langues. Spécialiste de l'Asie du Sud-Est, Rodolphe De Koninck s'est aussi beaucoup intéressé à la géographie québécoise. En 1990, il a été élu membre de la Société royale du Canada. En 1998, il a reçu le prix Jacques-Rousseau (interdisciplinarité) de l'ACFAS et, l'année suivante, le prix Innis-Gérin (sciences humaines) de la Société royale du Canada.

« Il faut d'abord convaincre les gens qu'ils seront touchés tôt ou tard par des désastres naturels, et peut-être décideront-ils ensuite de prendre des mesures pour s'y préparer. » (Denis Milet, professeur émérite, Université du Colorado à Boulder et vice-président de la California Seismic Safety Commission)

Suivant le conseil du professeur Milet, et pour mieux informer le public sur les désastres naturels qui se produisent au Canada et sur leurs impacts, le Projet de sensibilisation aux aléas géologiques (Ressources naturelles Canada) a collaboré avec l'Atlas du Canada pour mettre à jour les pages Web de l'Atlas qui traitent des aléas naturels. Des experts de la Commission géologique du Canada (CGC) ont compilé de l'information en vue de dresser de nouvelles cartes des **tremblements de terre, des inondations, des feux de forêt, des glissements de terrain, des aléas spatiométéorologiques, des ondes de tempête, des volcans et des tsunamis**. Chaque carte est accompagnée d'un texte rédigé dans une langue claire et simple, illustrée d'excellentes photos et de diagrammes efficaces qui décrivent les caractéristiques de l'aléa naturel considéré (distribution, mécanismes, fréquence/magnitude), ses impacts, les stratégies d'atténuation et la vulnérabilité de la population et des infrastructures. On y a ajouté des exemples et des photographies de catastrophes naturelles qui se sont produites au Canada, afin d'aider les lecteurs à comprendre les impacts que ces aléas ont et continueront d'avoir au Canada. Pour chaque aléa naturel, on a conçu un jeu-questionnaire en ligne qui permettra aux internautes de mettre à l'épreuve leurs connaissances sur les aléas naturels.

Les cartes des catastrophes naturelles s'adressent au public qui fréquente déjà le site Web de l'Atlas du Canada, notamment les enseignants et les étudiants, le grand public et une foule de groupes du secteur privé et du secteur public. Les cartes indiquent la répartition des aléas naturels et présentent des faits et chiffres (comme le nombre de décès et les pertes économiques) qui démontrent qu'aucune région du Canada n'est épargnée et que les catastrophes naturelles ont eu des impacts considérables par le passé. Le texte descriptif qui accompagne chacune des cartes renseigne les gens sur les mesures qu'ils peuvent prendre pour se préparer à une catastrophe naturelle. Un lien les conduit au site Web « préparez-vous.ca » de Sécurité publique Canada, où ils peuvent trouver une abondance d'information utile qui s'inscrit dans le continuum éducation-atténuation.

'People need to be convinced that natural disasters happen, that they are going to be personally affected, and only then might they decide to do something about becoming personally prepared'. (Denis Milet, Professor Emeritus, University of Colorado at Boulder and Vice Chairman California Seismic Safety Commission)

Following Milet's advice and to increase the public awareness of natural hazards in Canada and their impacts, the Geohazard Awareness Project (Natural Resources Canada) worked in partnership with the Atlas of Canada to update the Atlas's web pages on Canadian natural hazards. Geological Survey of Canada (GSC) natural hazard experts compiled information for new maps depicting **earthquakes, floods, forest fires, landslides, space weather, storm surges, volcanoes and tsunamis**. Each map is accompanied by plain-language text, with excellent photos and diagrams that describes the natural hazard (distribution, mechanisms, frequency/magnitude), its impacts, mitigation and vulnerability. Case-studies and photographs of damage from past Canadian disasters are included to aid readers in understanding that these hazards have and will again affect Canada. On-line quizzes specific to each natural hazard were developed to allow users to test their natural hazard knowledge.

The target audience for the natural hazard maps is the existing one that already frequents the Atlas of Canada website, including the education community, general public, and a range of groups from the private and public sector. The maps showing the distribution of natural hazards and the "deaths and dollars" case studies demonstrate that natural hazards occur in all regions of Canada, and that there have been significant impacts in the past. Having "hooked" the reader's interest within the descriptive text of each natural hazard there is a section on what people can do to become prepared. This directs them to the wealth of useful information on the Public Safety of Canada website Getprepared.ca - which completes the 'education to mitigation' information chain.
