At first glance, the more recent figures look unsettling, and they are certainly a cause for concern. We should bear in mind, however, that the recent downturn in membership is largely a reflection of exceptional circumstances. In 2018, we held our meeting in conjunction with the IGU, and the CAG was unable to offer a registration discount to our members. We expected this would result in a dip in the 2018 membership (which it did) and anticipated that it may take two or three years to recover. The figures in 2019 suggested that a recovery was on track, but then COVID-19 struck and we had to cancel our annual conference. In spite of this, we remain optimistic as we reinvigorate our conference, and re-invest in our organization. The Board will be looking also to reinvigorate a membership committee to clarify and raise awareness of the benefits of membership.

Concluding comments:

Current geopolitics being what they are, we are – as an organization – acutely aware of what it means to be in the academy as faculty, staff and/or student. We cherish our academic freedom and the contributions we make with our work. Let's come together, work together, share together, and revitalize together for the greater good.
